Decorum in the Anteroom

The Anteroom is the place of first impres- sion to the candidate or visitor, and first impressions are often the most lasting. Yet, in the Anteroom, thoughtless lapses in good con- duct are likely to occur. Especial effort, there- fore, should be made to preserve its dignified and hospitable atmosphere. The Anteroom is often chosen as a place in which to tell stories. See to it that you neither tell nor listen to sto- ries unbecoming a gentleman. Most so-called "funny" stories are forced, banal, low, and almost wholly lacking in cleverness or humor. They have no place anywhere about the Lodge. Clean stories and wholesome jollity in the lounge or game room are entirely proper and promote good fellowship. Smoking, where per- mitted, should be done as circumspectly as it is in the home. Repeated light singes and scorch- es of furniture and floor soon lend a shabby appearance to the room.

You should realize that your attendance is needed in the lodgeroom and that the ante-room is only for temporary use. The brother who learns and gives the Master's lecture deserves credit for his work and the least we can do is to show him our appreciation by remaining until he is finished. On the other hand, the Master should not expect the brethren to remain if he attempts to give the lecture just before midnight. He is more likely to have a pros- perous Lodge if it is opened and closed early. In our jurisdiction, smoking is never allowed in the lodgeroom during the conferring of a degree and should not be in the anteroom and examination room, but in the place provided for that purpose. Smokers, enjoying a cigar or cigarette themselves, are apt to be just a little careless of the sensibilities of others to whom tobacco fumes may be actually offensive. The visitor to your Lodge, to whom smoking may be objectionable, may be too much of a gentleman to allow his disapproval to appear on the surface, and we should show him the same genuine hospitality we would in our own homes.

If the applicant appears nervous, which will probably be due to ill-advised joking by his friends, reassure him by telling him that there is no "horse-play" in Masonry and that every form, or ceremony, is intended to teach him a lesson.

Monday, February 17 GeneGeorge Washington Resigning His Commission by John Trumbull

Presidents' Day, officially **Washington's Birthday**, in the United States, is a federal holiday observed on the third Monday of February in honor of George Washington (born on February 22), the first President of the United States. The holiday is popularly recognized as also honoring Abraham Lincoln (born on February 12), and sometimes all the U.S. presidents.

The federal holiday commemorating Washington was established in 1879 for government offices in Washington only and later (1885) <u>expanded</u> to a whole country. <u>The Uniform Monday Holiday Act</u> from 1968 changed the date to the third Monday in February (effective as of 1971). As of 1971 and depending on a given (Gregorian calendar) year, the date of Presidents' Day falls between February 15 and 21. Hence it never occurs on February 22, i.e., the actual Washington's birthday. Similarly, it also misses Lincoln's Birthday on February 12.

Secrecy

Masonry is not a secret society in that its name and objects are generally known. It has no secret doctrine and its philosophy may be known to anyone. We do keep our modes of recognition, and some of our rites and ceremonies secret, for they are methods of instruction. Secrecy here is necessary that our applicants may learn and appreciate the lesson Masonry teaches. Our brethren are bound together by this secrecy just as two persons who share a secret are bound together. Secret teachings do not become commonplace. If our lessons are given to the novice with the spice of curiosity they are the more readily learned. As mysteries, they have the power to goad men into action but as mere ceremonies, known to all, they would soon become worthless. Our imaginations are captivated by anything that is difficult to acquire but anything easily obtained is considered worthless.

California Masonic Code

- §100.073. MORAL LAW: Those generally accepted and customary rules and principles which relate to right and wrong conduct and to duty.
- A. The moral law prescribes the standards to which the actions of people should conform in their dealings with the Supreme Being, each other and themselves. The moral law includes only those sectarian rules and principles on which all men agree.
- B. The moral law is the same as natural law. Violations of the moral law are mala in se because they are violations which are morally wrong in themselves: violations which people of ordinary sensibility should recognize are wrong, without the intervention of a governmental proscription.
- C. The moral law does not include societal norms, customs, virtues or values which are derived from the established practices of a particular society. Violations of laws, rules or principles which are not morally wrong in themselves are mala prohibita: actions that are wrong only because they are prohibited by statute or other law. Many but not all violations of the moral law are criminal offenses. Not all criminal offenses are violations of the moral law. [Added: 2010.]
- §100.075. MORAL TURPITUDE: Any act of baseness, vileness or depravity during a violation of the moral law, even though not necessarily a criminal offense. For conduct to involve moral turpitude, it normally must be accompanied by an inherently evil intent. The most common examples of this inherently evil intent are:
- A. An intent to defraud;
- B. An intent to take a thing unlawfully (larceny); and
- C. An intent to harm a person or a thing. [Amended: 2010.] For more information, please refer to the Appendix on Grand Masters' Decisions.

"Interpretative" Degrees

When you were made a Master Mason you received the highest honors Masonry had to bestow. Progress in other branches of Masonry beyond the Third Degree gives you no authori- ty over your brethren of the Blue Lodge. There is no superiority in Masonry save that con- ferred by service to others.

A man's importance in Masonry is not gauged by the number of emblems he may wear, but only by what he is in his heart and the service he renders his brethren. The Blue Lodge comprises the first three degrees and constitutes all the essential and ancient part of Freemasonry.

Masonry neither encourages nor discourages membership in other fraternal orders, whether or not the Blue Lodge degrees are a prerequisite to membership in them. By becoming a Master Mason, you do not become obligated to take any of the so-called concordant degrees of Masonry, and whether you do or not is a matter of your own free choice. You have promised not to make such application until you are proficient in the candidate's lecture of the Degree of Master Mason.

Dual and Plural Membership

Under the regulations of this jurisdiction, both dual and plural memberships are permissible.

Dual Membership consists of belonging to a Lodge in this jurisdiction without having to terminate membership in a Lodge of another jurisdiction. This procedure is possible only in those cases where the other jurisdiction involved also permits Dual Membership.

Plural Membership consists of belonging to two or more Lodges, each of which are in this jurisdiction.

The complete details as to procedure in either instance should be reviewed with the Secretary of your Lodge before taking any steps toward affiliation as a Dual or Plural member.

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
